




#### About Us


# **CC Technical Assistance**

IRA provided EPA with \$200M for technical assistance (TA) for eligible entities related to the Environmental and Climate Justice Program, including the Community Change Grants.

Only available to eligible entities that intend to apply for the grants.

EnDyna and our partners were awarded contract in November 2023 to provide TA nationally.

- TA does not include writing an application for an applicant.



# Overview of Community Change Grants Program



### Introduction

EPA received \$3 billion through the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) to fund environmental and climate justice activities to benefit disadvantaged communities.

- \$2.8 billion for grants including \$2 billion for the Community Change Grants (CCG) Program.
- \$200 million for technical assistance related to the grants.
- Grants cannot exceed three years (no extensions).
- All grants must be awarded by September 30, 2026.



### Goals

Designed with meaningful community, Tribal and other stakeholder input, the investments EPA makes through the Community Change Grants are intended to achieve the following goals:



Fund community-driven pollution and climate resiliency solutions.

Invest in strong cross-sectoral collaborations with partners working with and for communities.

Unlock access to more significant resources.

Deliver technical assistance and capacity-building support.

Strengthen communities' decision-making power.

### Track I

#### **Community-Driven Investments for Change**

Funding Available: approx. \$1.96 billion Number of Awards: approx. 150 Per Award Amount: \$10M - \$20M each (cannot exceed \$20M)

### Track II

#### Meaningful Engagement for Equitable Governance

Funding Available: approx. \$40 million Number of Awards: approx. 20 Per Award Amount: \$1M - \$3M each (cannot exceed \$3M)



# Overview of Threshold Eligibility Criteria



# Eligibility

Applications must meet **all** eligibility criteria, as outlined in <u>Section III</u> of the NOFO, to be considered for funding.



Comply with the content and submission requirements.

Meet the eligibility and statutory partnership requirements in <u>Section III.A</u>.

Meet threshold criteria in <u>Section III.D</u>, including that the projects will benefit disadvantaged communities.

Projects must be completed within three years.


Applications to conduct scientific research; assessment, removal, or remediation of Superfund sites; or community relocation are ineligible.


# **Statutory Partnership**

Applicants must either be a partnership of two community-based nonprofit organizations (CBOs) or a partnership between a CBO and a federally recognized Tribe, local government or institution of higher education.

Partnerships must be documented and meet certain legal requirements (see <u>Appendix B</u>).

Additional information on eligibility and partnerships can be found in <u>Section III</u> of the NOFO.





Note: While the CBO does not have to be the "Lead Applicant," all statutory partnerships must include a CBO.

# Collaborating Entities

Other entities can be involved in projects as collaborating entities.

Collaborating Entities may include entities that legally could be Statutory Partners (CBOs, Federally-recognized Tribes, local governments, and institutions of higher education) and entities that cannot legally be Statutory Partners (e.g., states and territorial governments).





## Disadvantaged Communities

Applicants must demonstrate that the projects in their application will benefit a disadvantaged community. EPA is defining disadvantaged community as one that meets at least one of the following criteria:



A geographically-defined community identified as disadvantaged on the EPA IRA <u>Disadvantaged Communities</u> <u>Map</u>

A Disadvantaged Unincorporated Community (DUC)

OR

A farmworker community

# **Community Strength** Plan


- Advancing environmental and climate justice requires bolstering the strength and economic prosperity of a community for the benefit of local residents, while also ensuring those residents can remain within the community and benefit from the investments over the long term.
- This plan should describe how the projects are intended to: • maximize the economic benefits of the projects for
  - existing residents in the Project Area, and
  - avoid unintended consequences for existing residents in the Project Area including the displacement of residents in the Project Area.



# **Readiness Approach**

- needed.
- Federal Requirements for Construction: Complies with any statutory and EO requirements that apply to construction projects.
- Alignment with Existing Plans: Project is consistent with governmental land use restrictions.
- Site Control: Owns, controls or has legal access to the site of a project.
- Operations and Maintenance: Operations and maintenance of the investment will be assured during and after the grant award.

To ensure projects can begin shortly upon award and be completed within 3 years, applicants must demonstrate: • Government Approvals: Obtained government approval if



# **Compliance Plan**

Applicants must submit a Compliance Plan that describes how they will:



### **SELECTION PROCESS**

### **Eligibility**

**Applications** reviewed for threshold eligibility.

#### Written Evaluation

Written applications that receive a score of 110 or higher (out of 155) will be invited to give an oral presentation.

### **Oral Presentations**

Worth a maximum of 45 points.

Applications with a combined score of 170 or more, based on written and oral, move to final selection consideration.

**Applications** reviewed for threshold eligibility. Written applications that receive a score of 85 or higher (out of 100) will move to final selection consideration.





### **Final Consideration**

Applications receiving a combined score of between 110 and 169 will be ranked and reviewed approx. monthly for final selection consideration.

Applications receiving a score below 85 will be ranked and reviewed approx. monthly for final selection consideration.



# Debriefings and Disputes

Applicants who are deemed ineligible or who are not selected for funding may request a debriefing.

For more information on the debriefing and dispute process, see <u>Section VI</u> of the NOFO.

## Resubmission

Applicants who are deemed eligible but are not selected for funding may, after timely requesting and receiving a debriefing on the application, resubmit.
