Definition of Disadvantaged Communities

- Geographically defined by the EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities Layer
- Farmworker Community
- Disadvantaged Unincorporated Community





Benefit Disadvantaged Communities

- The IRA requires this funding to benefit disadvantaged communities, as defined by Appendix A in the NOFO.
- The NOFO provides a definition of disadvantaged communities in Appendix A.
- Applicants must demonstrate that the projects in their application would benefit a disadvantaged community.
- Applicants can determine whether they are a disadvantaged community using the IRA Disadvantaged Community map layer in EJScreen.

A disadvantaged community is defined as a community that meets at least one of the following criteria:

- A geographically defined community designated as disadvantaged on the EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities Layer
- 2. A farmworker community*
- 3. A DisadvantagedUnincorporated Community(DUC)*

Disadvantaged Communities



*Sometimes, a community may fit in more than one disadvantaged category



The definition includes all of the following:


- Any census tract that is identified as disadvantaged in CEJST
- Any census block group that is at or above the 90th percentile for any of EJScreen's Supplemental Indexes when compared to the nation or state
- Any geographic area within Tribal lands, as included in EJScreen*

EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities

EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities





A Farmworker Community is made of individuals with:

- no fixed work address,
- who travel from their permanent residence to work in agriculture on a temporary or seasonal basis, and
- may relocate several times throughout the year.

Farmworker Community

Applicants can demonstrate that a farmworker community is comprised of such individuals by submitting verification documentation from an authorizing governmental entity or through comparable means.




- Census Designated Places that lack fixed legally determined geographic boundaries
- Includes all areas defined as Colonias by the U.S.
 Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).
- Colonias that are not defined by HUD but are identifiable on the "Colonias" layer in EJScreen are also considered DUCs.

Disadvantaged Unincorporated Community (DUC)



Mapping Requirements

- Applications
- Project Area Map



Applications

All applications must demonstrate that the projects in their application would benefit a disadvantaged community.

Track 1

- Must submit a Project Area Map
- See full instructions in Appendix A in the NOFO

Track 2

- Not required to submit a Project Area Map.
- Must describe and identify the disadvantaged communities that will benefit from the projects.



Project Area Summary

For Track 1 Applications:

- The ECJ CCG program is intended to create place-based, transformative, concentrated investments.
- Concentrated and compact Project Areas may maximize benefits
- Activities spread across a large Project Area may be more dispersed and less impactful to the designated disadvantaged communities.

Full Instructions in Appendix A in NOFO.

- Must encompass a defined disadvantaged community.
- Must identify the specific census block groups designated as disadvantaged communities
- One Project Area Map with an outlined Project Area boundary, within the Project Area Map the disadvantaged communities do not need to be connected



Should include:

- The Project Area with an outlined boundary.
- Main streets, landmarks, or both.
- Community assets (e.g., parks or play areas, schools, community center).
- Jurisdictional boundaries, including incorporated and unincorporated areas.
- Any other attributes that may provide important context about the Project Area
- Reflect where each project submitted under the application is located within the Project Area



All projects and activities should be located within the Project Area, except where:

- Necessary to address localized pollution at the source, or
- Otherwise, necessary for the disadvantaged community to benefit from the project.

Example: if the project addresses water quality issues upstream to benefit a downstream community.

May include multiple census block groups that are designated as a disadvantaged community by EPA, but the disadvantaged census block groups need not be fully contiguous with each other.

• Example: A protected bike path that starts in a disadvantaged community tract, goes through a neighboring non-disadvantaged community tract, and then goes through another disadvantaged community tract is eligible.

Farmworking communities and DUC applicants are required to submit a Project Area Map specifying where the communities and projects designed to benefit them are located.

Applications addressing these communities are not required to submit a map showing census block groups designated as disadvantaged.

- Screening tool
- Contains IRA Disadvantaged Community Layer and can be used to create Project Area Map

Demo on Creating a Project Area Map

- Maps can be generated in EPA's EJScreen tool using the IRA disadvantaged community layer.
- Additionally, applicants also have the option to submit a map in another geospatial format such as a shapefile (.shp), geodatabase (.gbd), or map service.




How to Create a Project Map Area

Maps can be generated in EPA's EJScreen tool using the IRA disadvantaged community layer.



- No
- However, all applications must benefit disadvantaged communities

Can a Track I application include projects with activities that are carried out on a regional, county, or statewide basis?

 While a regional, county, or statewide project may technically be eligible, depending on the specific content of an application, it may be unlikely that such an application would score well and be successful considering the NOFO evaluation criteria, objectives, and requirements. Can a Track II application focus on facilitating the engagement of disadvantaged communities in different cities and/or states in governmental processes?

- Yes,
- There is no Project Area Map required for Track II applications,
- Track II applications do not have to be as place-based as Track I applications.

Key Messages

- Projects must be benefiting a defined disadvantaged community
- Disadvantaged communities are defined 3 ways:
 - Geographically defined by the EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities Layer
 - Farmworker community
 - Disadvantaged Unincorporated Community
- Project Area Maps are a threshold requirement for Track 1
- EJScreen Tool can be used to develop Project Map areas using the IRA disadvantaged community layer.



 - ➤ EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities





 - > Click on map and create outline around Project Area








